Which Role for Constitutional Courts in Modern Democracies? Reflecting on the Palestinian Supreme Constitutional Court Ramallah, 25-26 October 2008

Concept Note

Modern Democracies reserve a prominent place for written constitution. The supremacy of its provisions over other legislations is secured by the same judge authorized to enforce the law whenever a conflict (of any kind) arises, by a Council established to effectuate a control over statutes before their endorsement, or by a Constitutional Court, established in purpose, with the main task to control the constitutionality of legislations in force.

The Basic Law (BL) for the Palestinian Authority (PA) opted for the establishment of a Supreme Constitutional Court (SCC) but left its formation and regulation for the law. Only in 2006 that a law establishing a SCC was adopted but the composition of the Court did not yet see the light. The drafting process of this law, as much as its adoption, was accompanied by vivid discussions within jurists, politicians and decision makers.

This conference intends to revive the discussion over the place, role and importance of the SCC in the current Palestinian legal and political systems. Many questions need to be frankly discussed, avoiding any political *clichés*, regarding the composition of the SCC, its functions and competences, its relationship with the judicial power, the guarantees to its independence from interference of the executive and the way it will control the acts of the legislator.

The comparison with other experiences, representative of the different ways the constitutionality of laws is secured, may help the participants to appreciate or to criticize the system that is being finally institutionalized in the Palestinian territories.

The SCC may realize its objectives and purposes only in a context of respect for the rule of law but it may also contribute to the consolidation of such a system, in which individuals and state organs are subordinated to specific rules that are necessary to the cohesion of the community composing the 'state' and to the insurance of the checks and balances between state's authorities. Those binding rules express the compromise that is necessary for the political existence of a community, often redacted in a legal text and given a superior value to other laws.

The conference needs to drop the light on the Palestinian particularity in constitutional issues, for being under occupation, with a PA jurisdiction which is theoretically limited to the interim period, and with a BL which shall be replaced

by a constitution once the state is established. The Palestinian constitutional experience remains unique and shall be treated as such.
