# Towards an Open Data Act in Germany

- Plan G8 Open Data Charter June 2013 → National Action
- Coalition agreement for the 18th legislative term (2013 – 2017):



"On the basis of law, the federal administration and all its authorities must play a pioneering role in the provision of open licence condition." data in uniform, machine-readable formats and under free

## The German Open Data Act



- Ministry of Interior and adopted by the Federal Draft Open Data Act prepared by the Federal Cabinet on 25 January 2017.
- Adopted by German Parliament (Bundestag) on 18 May 2017.
- Entered into force on 13 July 2017.
- Creates a robust legal basis for Open Data
- Clarifies for both data users and providers what has to be released.

## Content of the Open Data Act

- Raw data collected by federal authorities
- are basically "open by default",
- must be published without delay,
- must be available free of charge,
- must be provided in machine-readable format,
- may be used freely by everybody,
- must be described with metadata published in the national portal GovData
- Advisory body/advice center for Open Data to be established.
- "Open by design" to be taken into account.

### Restrictions



- Provisions apply only to raw data (not to reports, decisions, etc.).
- Applies only to the federal administration (however, while others have committed to adopt Open Data Acts). some German federal states already have Transparency Acts
- Main exceptions:
- privacy protection,
- no research data (→ open access debate),
- exceptions defined in the Federal Freedom of endanger public security Information Act (IFG), e.g. where disclosure may

## Relation to other legal acts



- E-Government Act (EGovG):
- target group for Open Government Data = administration Open Data Act is an amendment to the EGovG;
- (PSI) and is focussed on re-use of already published transposes Directives 2003/98/EC and 2013/37/EU Information Reuse Act (IWG): information
- Federal Freedom of Information Act (IFG): but does not stipulate general publication defines legal right for individuals to access information Various special legal acts:
- include subject-specific rules on provision of information

## Expected effects of Open Data

- Support for development of new products and services which bring direct benefits to citizens
- New growth areas in the context of digital transformation.
- Time savings for users of applications utilising Open Data.
- Creation of new job opportunities.
- According to calculations in Germany (Konrad Adenauer Foundation), economic gains of at least EUR 12.1 billion over the next ten years.

- Started on 19 February 2013. sectors, e.g. Includes more than 20 000 datasets in various
- environment (≈ 4 700),
- economy and finances (≈ 4 100),
- justice, legal system and public security (≈ 2 200)
- education, culture and sports (≈ 2 000),
- transport (≈ 1 600).

# Open Data in Germany: the way forward

Coalition agreement for the 19th legislative term (2018 - 2021):



- "To further improve the opportunities and benefits of government, we will extend the provision of Open "We want to facilitate people's mobility and the Data by creating a second Open Data Act."
- transport of goods by new Open Data applications.
- At the same time, transparency can be created through open data, and fraud [...] can be combatted."
- "In the field of Open Data we want to make the Federal Government an international pioneer."
